





Doing some research

There is lots for applicants to consider when deciding what and where to study:

- What subject are they most interested in?
- What modules and options are on offer what does the university website say?
- What do they want to do next? Will the course help them start a career, go on to further study or keep their options open?
- Where do they want to study, what type of location, what's the cost of living?
- What grades do they need to get in? Universities and colleges set their own entry requirements, which can vary widely.



Search for and compare courses

What may matter to applicants

They can use the data and student survey insight to compare courses and find the right one for them.

- Is the course full-time, part-time, distance learning?
- Does it include a work placement?
- Is it accredited by a professional body?
- What do students think about the course?

Users can 'rate' the courses against their own criteria using the 'stars'.


