

## HESES20 workbook table exercises

These exercises describe some courses offered by a higher education provider. They are designed to give you practice in filling in the tables of the HESES20 workbook. All the courses described below can all be filled in on one workbook.

You may want to refer to your other webinar materials when completing these exercises, but we have provided you with a table below to look up price groups from HECoS and LDCS codes.

Please note:

- Each course description includes data that is applicable to more than one table. However, no individual course will require you to fill in all the tables.
- In these examples, when considering fundability status for Home and EU students we have considered only ELQ status. In reality, other criteria may apply to make them non-fundable.
- We have told you the mode for each course. You do not need to consider if they meet the definitions for full-time, sandwich year out or part-time.
- None of the examples overlap on Tables 1 to 3 (i.e. they are all entered on separate lines). However, they do overlap on Table 5. Courses D and E will require you to amend lines you've previously filled in for Courses A and C.

## Course A

How would you record these students on Tables 1 and 5?

<b>Course A</b>	<b>HNC in Business Studies (HECoS 100079, LDCS AA.3)</b>
Duration	One year full-time (42 weeks)
Student information	45 students are enrolled on this course for 2020-21: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• One student, who is starting in September, previously started a HNC in 2019-20 but withdrew in January 2020.</li> <li>• All other students are new to the provider.</li> </ul>
Fundability and residential status	All 45 students are classed as Home and EU (UK-domiciled). All 45 students are classed as OfS-fundable.
Further student information	35 students start the course in September 2020, and do not withdrawn by the census date. 10 students are due to commence in February 2021.
Historical information	In 2018-19, the same course had 15 students overall: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Two withdrew in January before undergoing the final assessment for that year.</li> <li>• All other students on this course in 2018-19 completed their year of instance.</li> </ul>

## Course B

How would you record these students on Tables 1 and 5?

Course B	Masters in Acoustics (HECoS 100427, LDCS RC.25)
Duration	1 year full-time (46 weeks, no work placement). This postgraduate taught course is designated for Master's degree loans.
Students	30 students are enrolled on this course for 2020-21, all are new to the institution in 2020-21.
Fundability and Residential status	The students can be broken down into the following characteristics: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• 8 Home and EU: UK domiciled – 6 fundable, 2 non-fundable</li><li>• 2 Home and EU: Other – both fundable</li><li>• 20 Island and overseas</li></ul>
Further student info	All students commence teaching on 1 October 2020.
Historical information	Non-completion rates: Home and EU 10%, Island and Overseas 8%

## Course C - Part-time HND in Film Studies

Duration	Part-time HND: 3 years. The equivalent full-time course takes 2 years; FTE (relative to an equivalent full-time course) is 0.67. Both the full-time and part-time courses involve 35 weeks of attendance per year, and commence on 1 October 2020.
Students	62 students: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 25 students in their 1<sup>st</sup> year of study, new to the institution in 2020-21</li> <li>• 20 students continuing into 2<sup>nd</sup> year</li> <li>• 17 students continuing into 3<sup>rd</sup> year.</li> </ul> No students are repeating a year. All are Home and EU, UK-domiciled
Entry qualifications	Entry qualifications relevant to fundability status. In each year, students have the following entry qualifications: 1 <sup>st</sup> year: A-level (18 students), HNC (2), HND (1), BA (4) 2 <sup>nd</sup> year: A-level (17 students), BA/BSc (2), MSc (1) 3 <sup>rd</sup> year: A-level (13 students), HNC (1), HND (3)
Historical information	Non-completion rate is 15% in all years.

## Course E - Foundation degree in Mathematics and Economics

Duration	Part-time foundation degree: 4 years. The equivalent full-time course takes 2 years. Equivalent full-time course is 39 weeks of activity per year. This split course consists of 240 credits, with 120 credits relating to each subject code.			
Students	209 students are enrolled on this course for 2020-21: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 60 in their 1<sup>st</sup> year of study, new to the institution in 2020-21</li> <li>• 54 continuing in their 2<sup>nd</sup> year</li> <li>• 49 continuing in their 3<sup>rd</sup> year</li> <li>• 46 continuing in their 4<sup>th</sup> year</li> </ul>

## Course F - Masters in Architecture

How would you record these students on Tables 1 and 5?

<b>Course F</b>	<b>Masters in Architecture (HECoS 100122, LDCS TD.1)</b>
Duration	1 year full-time, 47 weeks of activity, 10 of which are work-based study. This course is designated under the undergraduate student support arrangements (required for registration with the Architects Registration Board).
Students	30 students are enrolled on this course for 2020-21, all completed a bachelors' with the university last year.
Fundability and Residential status.	The students can be broken down into the following characteristics: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 10 Home and EU: UK domiciled – 9 fundable, 1 non-fundable</li> <li>• Home and EU: Other – no students</li> <li>• 20 Island and overseas</li> </ul>
Further student info	All students commence teaching on 1 October 2020.
Historical information	In the previous year, from 32 students: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 2 students withdrew before the final exam.</li> <li>• 23 students took the final exam and passed.</li> <li>• 5 students took the final exam and failed.</li> <li>• 1 student did not take the final exam as they had already gained enough marks to pass the year through coursework.</li> <li>• 1 student did not take the final exam and failed the coursework.</li> </ul> The non-completion rate is the same for all students.

### Course G – Full-time BSc Midwifery

Course G	Full-time BSc Midwifery degree
Duration	3 years full-time, 49 weeks of activity per year, including two four-week periods of clinical practice.
Students	There are 232 students in 2020-21: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 88 students in their 1<sup>st</sup> year</li> <li>• 70 students in the 2<sup>nd</sup> year</li> <li>• 74 students in the 3<sup>rd</sup> year</li> </ul>
Further course info	From 2019-20, this course was partly commissioned and funded by an NHS organisation. In 2020-21, this means that 10 students in the 1 <sup>st</sup> year and 10 students in the 2 <sup>nd</sup> year are charged zero fees, as this is paid by the NHS organisation.
Further student info	All students have a year of instance that commences on 1 October 2020.
Historical information	Non-completion rates are 10% in all years.

### Course H – Full-time MSc Nursing (adult)

Course H	Full-time MSc in Nursing (adult)
Duration	4 years full-time, 45 weeks of attendance per year, including a four-week period of work-based study. This course is designated under the undergraduate student support arrangements.
Students	There are 571 students in 2020-21: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 165 students in their 1<sup>st</sup> year</li> <li>• 150 students continuing into the 2<sup>nd</sup> year</li> <li>• 135 students continuing into the 3<sup>rd</sup> year</li> <li>• 121 students continuing into 4<sup>th</sup> year.</li> </ul> No students are repeating a year.
Further course info	From 2019-20, this course was partly commissioned and funded by an NHS organisation. In 2020-21, this means that 10 students in the 1 <sup>st</sup> year and 10 students in the 2 <sup>nd</sup> year are charged zero fees, as this is paid by the NHS organisation.
Further student info	All students commence their year of instance 1 October 2020.
Historical information	Non-completion rates are 10% in all years.

- Home and EU students meeting any of the following criteria should be recorded as non-fundable...
  - Students on courses that on successful completion lead to first registration as a professional in nursing, midwifery, dietetics, speech and language therapy, podiatry, or orthotics and prosthetics, and which are either of the following:
    - Postgraduate courses that students started prior to 1 August 2018.
    - Undergraduate courses that students started prior to 1 August 2017.
- Students on courses commissioned and funded by an NHS organisation, where the course fee charged to the student is zero because an NHS organisation is meeting the full costs of the course. This does not include students on courses studied as part of an apprenticeship, which remain fundable as long as all other fundability criteria are met. A course is commissioned by an NHS organisation if there is a contractual agreement with it that the provider will provide a certain number of places on the course. Other students on the same course who are not funded by an NHS organisation should be returned as fundable, where they meet all other relevant criteria.
